

Maintaining Your Pit Toilet

Pit toilets require very little upkeep once installed, but following proper maintenance and safe emptying guidelines is essential for long-term functionality and hygiene. We recommend the following:

1. Keep the pedestal and hut clean

Regular cleaning helps maintain hygiene and prevents odours. Use a mild anti-bacterial cleaner to wipe down the pedestal and the inside of the hut. This reduces bacterial build-up and keeps the toilet safe and pleasant to use.

Tip: Avoid harsh chemicals that may interfere with natural decomposition inside the pit.

2. Check for signs of structural wear

Periodically inspect the slab, hut and pedestal for cracks, loose fittings or signs of damage—especially in high-use areas. Early repairs help ensure safety and extend the lifespan of the installation.

3. Managing a full pit

When the waste level reaches within 0.5 metres of the top, the pit is considered full and should no longer be used.

At this point:

- Cover the full pit with soil to seal it off safely.
- Construct a new pit nearby and reinstall the slab and pedestal.

This helps prevent contamination and allows the old pit to break down naturally over time.
